School Council membership is a great way for parents to become involved in the governance of the school. The Council meet every 3rd Tuesday of the month commencing at 5.30pm. The Annual General Meeting for Camp Hill School Council will be held on Tuesday 15th March at 5:30pm followed by a normal School Council meeting. There are 3 Parent vacancies for a period of 2 years. There are 2 DET vacancies by rotation for a two year term. Any interested parents are urged to nominate for School Council.

On behalf of the School Council, I would like to extend thanks to the retiring members who have made valuable contributions to School Council.

From Monday 7th February, nomination forms for the 2022 elections will be available from the office. Parents and DET staff have the opportunity to either be nominated or self-nominate.

Nominations are to be lodged at school no later than Monday 14th February at 4pm.

A ballot (if required) will commence on Monday 21st February and close on Monday 28th February at 4pm.

Information packs and nomination forms can be collected from the office. Please do not hesitate to come and have a chat if you have any questions regarding School Council.

What is a school council and what does it do?

All government schools in Victoria have a school council. They are legally constituted bodies that are given powers to set the broad direction of a school, in accordance with Ministerial Order 1280 Constitution of Government School Councils, and the Education and Training Reform Act 2006. In doing this, a school council may directly influence the quality of education for students.

Who is on the school council?

For most primary school councils, there are several possible categories of membership:

- A mandated elected parent member category more than one-third of the total members must be from this category. Department employees can be parent members at their child's school providing that they are not engaged in work at the school.
- A mandated elected school employee member category members of this category make up no more than onethird of membership. The principal of the school is automatically one of these members.
- An optional community member category members are co-opted by a decision of the council because of their special skills, interests or experience. Department employees are not eligible to be community members.
- A small number of school councils have nominee members.

For all schools with a Year 7 and above cohort, there is an additional category of membership:

A mandated elected student member category, two positions.

Generally, the term of office for all members is two years. The term of office of half the members expires each year, creating vacancies for the annual school council elections.

Why is parent membership so important?

Parents on school councils provide important viewpoints and have valuable skills and a range of experiences and knowledge that can help inform and shape the direction of the school.

Those parents who become active on a school council find their involvement satisfying and may also find that their children feel a greater sense of belonging.

Do I need special experience to be on school council?

Each member brings their own valuable skills and knowledge to the role, however, in order to successfully perform their duties, councillors may need to gain some new skills and knowledge.

It is important to have an interest in your child's school and the desire to work in partnership with others to help shape the school's future.

Mobile Phone Policy

From January 1st, 2020, students who choose to bring mobile phones to school must have them switched off and securely stored during school hours. Please find attached the school's mobile phone policy, parents of students wishing to bring a mobile phone to school must complete a Parent Permission Form and have it endorsed by the Principal. Please be aware in accordance with the school's mobile phone policy, students who have their phones out at school will have them confiscated and parents will be asked to collect them at the end of the school day.

MOBILE PHONES – STUDENT USE

Purpose

To explain to our school community the Department's and Camp Hill Primary School's policy requirements and expectations relating to students using mobile phones and other personal mobile devices eg. smartwatches etc. during school hours.

Scope

This policy applies to:

All students at Camp Hill Primary School and students' personal mobile phones and other personal mobile devices eq. smartwatches etc brought onto school premises during school hours, including recess and lunchtime.

Definitions

A mobile phone is a telephone with access to a cellular (telecommunication) system, with or without a physical connection to a network. For the purposes of this policy, "mobile phone" refers to mobile phones and any device that may connect to or have similar functionality to a mobile phone such as smartwatches.

Policy

Camp Hill Primary School understands that students may bring a personal mobile phone to school, particularly if they are travelling independently to and from school.

At Camp Hill Primary School:

- Students who choose to bring mobile phones to school must have them switched off and securely stored in their bags during school hours
- Exceptions to this policy may be applied if certain conditions are met (see below for further information)
- When emergencies occur, parents or carers should reach their child by calling the school's office.

Personal mobile phone use

In accordance with the Department's <u>Mobile Phones Policy</u> issued by the Minister for Education, personal mobile phones must not be used at Camp Hill Primary School during school hours, including lunchtime and recess, unless an exception has been granted.

Where a student has been granted an exception, the student must use their mobile phone for the purpose for which the exception was granted, and in a safe, ethical and responsible manner.

Secure storage

Mobile phones owned by students at Camp Hill Primary School are considered valuable items and are brought to school at the owner's (student's or parent/carer's) risk. Students are encouraged not to bring a mobile phone to school unless there is a compelling reason to do so. Please note that Camp Hill Primary School does not have accident insurance for accidental property damage or theft. Students and their parents/carers are encouraged to obtain appropriate insurance for valuable items. Refer to the Department's Personal Goods policy.

Where students bring a mobile phone to school, Camp Hill Primary School will provide secure storage. Secure storage is storage that cannot be readily accessed by those without permission to do so. At Camp Hill Primary School students are required to store their phones in their bags, phones must be turned off at all time during school hours.

Enforcement

Students who use their personal mobile phones inappropriately at Camp Hill Primary school may be issued with consequences consistent with our school's *Student Wellbeing and Engagement* policy.

Consequences

- · Confiscation of the phone (placed in secure storage and returned at the end of the day)
- · Parents contacted and informed of the student's breech of the school's mobile phone policy
 - At Camp Hill Primary School inappropriate use of mobile phones is any use during school hours, unless an exception has been granted, and particularly use of a mobile phone:
- in any way that disrupts the learning of others
- to send inappropriate, harassing or threatening messages or phone calls
- · to engage in inappropriate social media use including cyber bullying
- to capture video or images of people, including students, teachers and members of the school community without their permission
- to capture video or images in the school toilets, changing rooms, swimming pools and gyms
- during exams and assessments

Exceptions

Exceptions to the policy:

· May be applied during school hours if certain conditions are met, specifically health and wellbeing-related exceptions and can be granted by the principal or principal's representative, in accordance with the Department's Mobile Phones Policy. Exceptions:

1. Health and wellbeing-related exceptions

Specific exception	Documentation
Students with a health condition	Student Health Support Plan

Camps, excursions and extracurricular activities

Camp Hill Primary School will provide students and their parents and carers with information about items that can or cannot be brought to camps, excursions, special activities and events, including personal mobile phones.

Exclusions

This policy does not apply to travelling to and from school.

Why 'It's Not OK to Be Late to School' Latecomers:

- miss out on talking to their class teacher before school
- miss out on playing with other children before school
- miss out on organisation time, for example getting their workbooks and pencil case from their tub and setting up their table for the day
- miss out on roll marking and taking notices to the office and their notices (eg, special day lunch orders) often stay in their school bag
- miss out on learning time when they take their notices to the office
- miss out on hearing what's happening for the day
- are often unsure about what they have to do in the lesson
- can arrive at their classroom to find that their class has gone to a specialist lesson and they may not know where to go
- particularly miss out on reading and writing learning time
- find learning becomes disjointed and difficult

In preparation for school Polly has had a 'haircut' and like many students & staff is having her vaccination shot next week.


We can't wait to have Polly back at school over the coming weeks.



LOTE

Saying goodbye to the Ox, we enter the Year of the Tiger. You might have already heard our students talking about how we welcome the Year of the Tiger so as to bring good luck and good health to everyone. When is the Lunar New Year 2022? The date of Lunar New Year varies from year to year as it follows the cycle of the moon, but the auspicious date typically falls either towards the end of January or in early February. This year, 1st February marks the beginning of the Lunar New Year. The celebration will end on 15th February, with the Lantern Festival. Chinese New Year is China's most important traditional festival, with many interesting customs. Our students are very curious about why the Chinese do what they do during the Chinese New Year.

Our Grade One and Two students had a quick discussion on the 12 zodiac animals and they did the one hundred Chinese challenge just to revisit what they had learnt in Prep and Grade One. They also made their cover page for their Chinese exercise books.

Grade Three to Six, students had a discussion on what they would like to do in Chinese, eg. the language games and online activities. They expressed their interest in some specific topics and cultural activities. Importantly, students will reflect on how to build a positive learning environment in the class and then they will see the growth of self and peers. They will choose to either make a tiger book mark or a 3D standing tiger to mark the beginning of the Year of the Tiger wishing everyone is as strong as a tiger.
